Students of Swarnim International School brought accolades to the school by bagging the Zonal Ranks in the SOF National Science and Mathematics Olympiad conducted by Science Olympiad Foundation in February, 2020. In crisis, we have all become better learners. We learnt that a crisis is both danger and opportunity. And the teaching community is the biggest proof of the limitless possibilities human mind cradles and brings forth when required. The entire schooling system transformed overnight into a shared virtual space which dissolved the barriers of traditional privacy norms. It turned the student-teacher-parent locus upside down. Nursery - DUMB CHARADE

As we all know that 'Dumb Charade' game involves explaining and identifying the name of a song or a book through mime. Our Nursery children dressed up and acted out popular rhymes by using different gestures, facial expressions and their friends had to guess the rhyme. The focus was to reinforce non verbal communication skills and creativity.

LKG - FUN WITH EVS

LKG children enthusiastically participated and revised various EVS topics they covered throughout the year by playing the game "GUESS WHO AM I". Children dressed up as Birds, Vegetables, Insects, Body Parts, Seasons, Colours, Transport, Communication etc. and gave various clues to their fellow classmates who in turn guessed who they were. It was a recapitulation experience with lot of color and fun.



UKG - CVC WORD WHEEL

"Words and ideas can change the world."

Our little thinkers of UKG created a CVC (consonant-vowel-consonant) word wheel to incorporate their learning about three-letter words into an interesting cognitive exercise where they matched a consonant with two-letter words to form a three letter word. CVC word wheels gave our children the practice to manipulate the initial sound of a given CVC word family and form new words. This exercise increases vocabulary and reinforces the concept of phonics.

Class 1 - SCENERY WITH SYNONYMS

The vernacular students of class I were introduced to the topic "synonyms" in a very interesting way. Synonyms were taught as "Ek Naam Aur" in Hindi and " Arekta Naam" in Bengali classes. The children were asked to draw scenery and label each thing with multiple names. E.g. Aasmaan – Nabh, Pahaad – Parwat, Ped – Vriksh, and for Bengali Bari- Griha, Surjo- Robi, Phool- Kusum etc.

Class 2 - FINISH THE STORY

The aim of this game for Class II was to create a complete story as a team. Children were divided into groups and each child had to contribute a few sentences and then the other children took turns to continue the story and complete it. The activity developed each player's story weaving skill and acted as an inspiration for the future wordsmiths.

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Class 3 - READER'S THEATRE


Children enacted the story of "The Pied Piper Returns". They understood the script and immersed themselves in the story. They did a dramatic presentation with special costumes and well rehearsed dialogue delivery. They also learnt to identify various characters, the varying moods of each character and displayed the emotions wonderfully.

Class 4 - HYDROELECTRICTY

Students showcased their understanding of the concept of hydroelectricity generation through drawing and explanation.

Students were very excited to know about the facts how a dam creates electricity. Through this topic they learnt the difference between exhaustible and inexhaustible sources of energy.

Students could relate it with real life and how it is helpful in irrigation facilities, flood control and in the generation of electricity.





Class 5 - MONEY MATTERS

To help students become familiar with the purpose and value of money, an activity was designed for class 5 students wherein they set up shops of various items in the virtual platform and enacted as sellers.

They could understand transaction of money in sale and purchase of goods and how to count change, learnt the difference between cost price and selling price, calculate profit and loss and prepare bills. The activity aimed at imparting two very important life-skills: how to handle money and its importance.

Class 6 - ENERGY CONSERVED IS ENERGY GENERATED

With a constantly growing human population the need for energy is also increasing. Today, having realized the energy crisis that we are headed to, we have put a step forward in using renewable sources of energy. Children of Class VI were sensitized about this topic.

They did 'Desalination of Salty Water Using Solar Energy'. They were asked to take a bowl full of salty water covered with a plastic sheet. They had to keep it in the sun and observe. They did this experiment and observed droplets of water on the plastic sheet. Hence they concluded that using the heat from the sun we can desalinate water and make it fit for drinking. They inferred that since fresh water available to man is decreasing with the growing population, we need to look for other sources. Sea is the biggest source of water but it is not potable. One can set up such desalination units of bigger size to generate potable water.





Class 7 – INNOVATIVE ENTREPRENEURS

Class VII was at their creative best when they came up with their unique product designs and marketing ideas. Each child designed a product that can be used to make our daily lives easier. Then they pitched their ideas in the class and discussed how they could market those products with lucrative deals. One child remarked, "If only I had the chance to sell this in the real market, I would be so rich!" Children learnt how to defend their ideas and establish them successfully through this exciting activity.




SCIENTIA POTENTIA EST: KNOWLEDGE IS POWER
